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INTRODUCTION

THE SECOND SESSION OF THE 57TH LEGISLATURE BEGAN FEBRUARY 3 WITH THE USUAL EXCITEMENT AND OPTIMISM. REVENUE PROJECTIONS WERE RELATIVELY FLAT, MEANING THE WORK ON THE BUDGET WOULD NOT TAKE FOCUS AWAY FROM OTHER IMPORTANT POLICY MATTERS.

On March 11, 2020 the NBA game in Oklahoma City between the Oklahoma City Thunder and the Utah Jazz was halted shortly before tipoff when Rudy Gobert, a Jazz player, tested positive for COVID-19. On March 17, 2020, the Oklahoma Legislature shut down due to the virus.

In early April, Governor Kevin Stitt invoked the Catastrophic Health Emergency Powers Act (CHEPA). Health emergency acts were passed in many states, including Oklahoma, to deal with the effects of a nuclear weapon, bioterrorism, chemical weapons or other biological toxins, following the terrorist attacks of 9/11. Oklahoma expanded the act in 2007 to apply to pandemic occurrences. CHEPA allows the Governor to temporarily suspend any statute needed to support the state's response to the pandemic and act through Executive Orders. This forced the legislature into special session to ratify the Governor's declaration. The declaration expired May 30.

The honeymoon the Governor and the legislature enjoyed last year came to an abrupt halt this year. The Governor vetoed 18 bills and the legislature overrode 10 of the vetoes. While a relatively small number of vetoes, it is a very large number of overrides. For comparison, former Governor Frank Keating vetoed a little more than 300 bills during his eight years as Governor. The then Democrat-controlled legislature did not override any of them.

Legislative leadership had to scramble to complete the session as they were only in session for 37 days. The normally very structured process of committee work was replaced with an "on the fly" process which left most of the pending legislation dead for the session. Only 169 bills were signed by the Governor along with the 18 vetoes.

The small number of policy bills making it through both chambers left a smaller than normal sample of business bills to score this year. Only ten pro-business bills on the RIED watch list before the legislature halted received a final vote in both chambers. Normally 16-20 bills would be scored. The good news is that the ten bills received overwhelming support with over one-half of the legislature (80) scoring a perfect 100, and only 33 members having a failing score of 69 or less.

With little time to deal with pro-business policy issues, the legislature focused on resolving disputes, cleaning up language, keeping economic development projects on track and protecting businesses trying to do commerce during a pandemic. Two seats, SD 28 and HD 89, were vacant this session.

Among the disputes that the legislature resolved were whether nurse anesthetists had to be supervised by a physician. Compromise language now has CRNAs working in collaboration with a physician and providing a definition of collaboration (SB 801). Another bill (SB 1875) establishes the oil and gas operator as the owner of the wastewater produced as a result of the drilling process, and is responsible for its disposal or processing. SB 1748 establishes the definition of "primarily engaged" as it relates to hospitals and directs the Commissioner of Health to review and adjust practices and standards relating to the licensing of hospitals. Finally, HB 3619 prohibits a political subdivision from prohibiting connections to facilities of utility providers or discriminating against them.

Language was needed to clean up a bill that provides tax credits for software and cybersecurity employees who take a job with a qualified employer in Oklahoma. The old language did not align with actual degree programs and left it unclear as to who could qualify for the tax credits.

The Oklahoma Local Development and Enterprise Zone Incentive Leverage Act allows local municipalities and political subdivisions to provide matching funds as an incentive to residential development but limits that development to no more than ten percent being used for commercial space. A bill (SB 1362) raises the commercial limit to 50 percent if that space is used for grocery or specialty food stores. Another bill (SB 1688) creates the Oklahoma Advanced Mobility Pilot Program and corresponding revolving fund to help spur investment in Oklahoma's emerging drone development industry. HB 4018 creates the Rural Broadband Expansion Act which creates a related council and fund to help find ways to increase broadband access throughout Oklahoma.

Finally, COVID-19 created a need for the legislature to protect Oklahoma businesses from potential liability while conducting business as normal if following all of the regulations in place at the time of any exposure (SB 1946). Another bill (SB 1947) protects businesses in Oklahoma from producing COVID-19 related goods and services if they do not make said products in their normal course of business as long as they act in good faith.

Overall, the legislature seems to have remained receptive to pro-business legislation in spite of the challenges of the session. It seems to remain focused on legislation that creates jobs, expands businesses and attracts new commerce to Oklahoma. It is my hope that this trend continues with the 58th Legislature as they convene in February 2021.

BILL SCORING AND EVALUATION

BILL SELECTION

Proposed legislation relating to business, job creation, elevation of income or economic growth can be nominated for evaluation. Nominations come from business interests, chambers of commerce, trade organizations, professional societies, academic interests, individuals and members of the legislature.

WEIGHTING

Bills are weighed on a scale from five to twenty with the most important legislation from this session receiving the highest weight. RIED staff reviews each bill and assigns an initial score. A private sector focus group comprised of RIED board members and representatives in the fields related to the proposed legislation follows the bill through the legislative process and issues a final recommendation. A committee made up of RIED board members or their designee meets to evaluate the bills being considered as well as to approve the bills used for final scoring.

BILL LIST

Legislators receive the current RIED bill list:

- After the first committee deadline date
- After the deadline to hear bills in their chamber of origin
- After the second committee deadline date
- After the deadline to hear bills in the opposite chamber
- Periodic updates are sent as bills are signed out of the conference committees (daily if necessary)

CALCULATION OF MEMBER VOTES

Approximately 20 of the most significant business related bills are used in calculating the final scores.

- Unless otherwise noted, legislative votes used for final scoring are the votes cast on final reading in both legislative chambers
- Member scores are determined by dividing individual points by the maximum number of points available
- Points are not deducted for absences. Absences do, however, represent a lost opportunity to score points. Co-authorship of a bill will be considered as voting in favor of the legislation.



BILLS ORIGINATING IN HOUSE

HB 3619**+20****By O'Donnell/Luttrell/Martinez (House) & Allen (Senate)**

Prohibits municipalities and political subdivisions from adopting any real estate development building or construction ordinance which prohibits connections to facilities of utility providers operating lawfully in the state. This would also prohibit codes or ordinances that would discriminate against any utility provider.

Do Pass 77-16 House; 38-7 Senate; signed by the Governor

HB 4018**+10****By McCall/Phillips/Strom/Townley (House) & Leewright/Bergstrom/Scott (Senate)**

Creates the Rural Broadband Expansion Act which creates a related Council and fund to investigate and provide recommendations on how to improve broadband access across the state.

Do Pass 94-2 House; 45-0 Senate; vetoed by the Governor, veto overridden by the Legislature 90-6 House; 43-1 Senate

BILLS ORIGINATING IN SENATE

SB 801**+20****By Rosino/Sharp/Scott/Dahm (Senate) & McEntire/Kerbs/McDugle/Davis/Cornwell/Fugate/Mize (House)**

Changes the requirement under the Oklahoma Nursing Practice Act that certain nurses be under the supervision of a doctor to instead work in collaboration with a doctor. This legislation is designed to increase access to healthcare across the state.

Do pass 44-0 Senate; 100-0 House; signed by the Governor

SB 1204**+20****By Bice (Senate) & Fetgatter/Fugate (House)**

Modifies provisions related to tax credits for certain qualified software and cybersecurity employers and employees. This bill clarifies the degree programs that would qualify an employee to receive tax credits for working for a qualified employer in Oklahoma.

Do pass 46-0 Senate; 99-0 House; signed by the Governor

SB 1362**+20****By Rader (Senate) & Fetgatter (House)**

Removes certain limitations on matching funds under the Local Development and Enterprise Zone Incentive Leverage Act for projects which provide for up to 50 percent of the net leasable space of a development to be used for grocery and specialty food stores.

Do pass 33-12 Senate; 80-19 House; signed by the Governor

SB 1688**+10****By Bergstrom (Senate) & McCall (House)**

Creates the Oklahoma Advanced Mobility Pilot Program and the Oklahoma Advanced Mobility Revolving Fund. The Program will focus on both advanced ground transportation, such as autonomous ground vehicles, as well as advanced air mobility vehicles.

Do pass 27-19 Senate; 88-10 House; signed by the Governor

SB 1748**+10****By Kidd (Senate) & Bush/Pittman (House)**

Establishes a definition of "primarily engaged" as relates to hospitals within statute and directs the Commissioner of Health to review hospital standards and practices and adjust standards related to revoked and restored licenses.

Do pass 44-2 Senate; 85-2 House; signed by the Governor

SB 1875**+20****By Rader (Senate) & O'Donnell/McBride/Davis (House)**

Creates the Oil and Gas Produced Water and Waste Recycling Act which requires parties producing oil and gas water and waste to be responsible for disposal or processing. This bill establishes the operator of a well to be the owner of the water and the waste produced in the drilling process and limits civil liability for subsequent use of recycled water.

Do pass 46-0 Senate; 93-3 House; signed by the Governor

SB 1946**+20****By Treat/Bullard (Senate) & McCall/O'Donnell/Lepak (House)**

Provides that persons conducting business in this state shall not be liable in a civil action claiming injury from exposure to COVID-19 if conduct was in compliance with regulations in place at the time of alleged exposure.

Do pass 34-11 Senate; 76-20 House; signed by the Governor

SB 1947**+20****By Treat/Bullard (Senate) & McCall/O'Donnell/Lepak (House)**

Provides that persons or businesses providing COVID-19 related goods and services to certain entities shall enjoy immunity from liability if they do not make said products in their normal course of business unless they have knowledge that the product was defective or act with deliberate intent.

Do pass 33-11 Senate; 82-15 House; signed by the Governor



COVID-19 SHORTENS LEGISLATIVE SESSION TO 37 DAYS; GOVERNOR VETOES 18 BILLS, LEGISLATURE OVERTURNS 10

The Research Institute for Economic Development (RIED), a non-partisan organization and producer of the annual RIED Report, a grading system of Oklahoma legislators' votes on key economic development and business issues, announced today its 2020 RIED Report. The scores were awarded to lawmakers who served during the second regular session of the 57th Oklahoma Legislature.

Under the RIED evaluation system, legislators earn points when they support job creation and economic development issues or vote against legislation that is harmful to job creation and economic development. A score of 70 and above represents a passing grade while 69 and below represents a failing grade. Ten measures were utilized to compile the 2020 RIED Report.

"Due to COVID-19, the legislature only met 37 days, and the cross-chamber committee process was eliminated which contributed to 10 business-related bills being scored," said Mark Williams, RIED president. "Normally, 16-20 business bills would be scored, but despite the session's historic nature, time constraints and large number of gubernatorial vetoes, I am extremely pleased an overwhelming majority of both chambers embraced these ten pro-business measures."

For the first time in RIED's 23-year history, over one-half of the legislature (80) scored a perfect 100, with only 33 members having a failing score of 69 or less. Overall, 114 of 147 legislators received passing scores of 70 or higher, including 35 of 47 Senate members and 79 of 100 House members. Two seats, SD 28 and HD 89, were vacant this session.

"Obviously, COVID-19 not only shortened the legislative session but changed its landscape in many ways, particularly in the number of health-related bills considered," said Greg Love, RIED board chairman. "To have the largest number of perfects scores in RIED history is very impressive, however it is important to note that those scores are not just a reflection of fewer overall bills being scored. It is because they are solid pro-business bills that will help Oklahoma's overall business environment, and at the end of the day, that is what is most important. My hope is the legislature, despite any changes this fall's elections may bring, and Governor Stitt will continue to promote pro-business legislation that positions Oklahoma as one of America's premier business opportunities."



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
